Hope for a Distressed Coal-Country Town: Dickson City Borough's Revitalization with NPS Assistance

In 2010 Dickson City Borough, a town of approximately 6,000 residents north of Scranton, Pennsylvania, was categorized as a "distressed" community, with a significant portion of the population living below the poverty line. In addition, a mall on the edge of the Borough pulled businesses and visitors away from Dickson City's Main Avenue, leaving dilapidated buildings and a loss of community pride.

Efforts to revitalize the downtown core started in 2015, with the Borough Council developing the Dickson City Downtown Market Study and Downtown Revitalization Plan, purchasing a vacant lot to create a riverfront park, and securing funding to design a walkable downtown streetscape and rehabilitate existing parks for greater accessibility. In 2021, the Borough enlisted NPS Rivers, Trails & Conservation

Assistance to broaden the partnership, secure additional funding, and develop a 15-year strategic plan for downtown revitalization with a public art component. Along with assistance for the strategic plan, NPS RTCA helped support the Borough in showcasing its successes at the recent Pennsylvania Greenways & Trails Summit hosted by WeConservePA in Scranton.

To date, Dickson City Borough has obtained more than \$4.5 million dollars in funding for the construction of their downtown streetscape, the rehabilitation of several parks, the extension of the Lackawanna Valley Heritage Trail, installation of shared bike lanes and the design of public art. Positive outcomes for the community include new businesses and skilled employment, a doubling of the average family income in five years, increased use of the existing parks and a safer, more accessible, pedestrian and bicycle trail network.

Dickson City Borough is a successful case of a former industrial community leveraging existing natural assets to promote economic development, implementing strategies focused on prescribed outdoor access, unique public gathering spaces, and recreational components that highlight connections to its Class A trout stream, the Lackawanna River.
